he first step to picking the perfect travel luggage is to consider every aspect of your trip, from the moment you leave your front door to the time you arrive at your destination. Your itinerary will determine your luggage requirements. How long are you travelling for? How many destinations are on your list? Will you be walking long distances with your luggage? Do you plan to take any gadgets with you?

FOR EXTENDED TRIPS, the best luggage to invest in is a suitcase, as it provides safety and gives you a clear view of all your belongings when you zip it open. Always go for a piece with wheels, an ergonomically designed, retractable handle or back straps. If you're a keen shopper, travel as lightly as possible so that you have extra space for all your purchases.

WHEELS: Wheels provide quick and easy mobility through the airport and ensure you don't break your back lugging cumbersome luggage around. Opt for spinner luggage with wheels that turn 360°, allowing for

Travel tips from seasoned travellers

When packing a suitcase, the genera rule is to place heavier items first and lighter ones last. Roll clothes to save space. If you do fold garments, place tissue paper between them to prevent creasing. Stuff bags and shoes with socks to save space and avoid crushing. Other handy items to pack are a hand-held steamer, washing powder (to avoid expensive dry-cleaning bills at hotels) and a bar of soap to keep your clothes smelling fresh.



EUGENE YIGA, writer and blogger (www.eugeneyiga.com) Because I travel with my technology, I always carry a universal adaptor, rechargeable batteries and a power bank. I also ensure I have plenty of notebooks and pens.

l use a sturdy, hardshell suitcase with a built-in combination lock (using a separate padlock doesn't guarantee safety). Hard items like shoes go at the bottom, followed by pants/ jeans and jackets, and lighter items like shirts on top.

blogger, www.inmybag.co.za I like to keep things to a minimum when packing beauty products for a trip. In my handbag, I ensure I have a small hand cream, a hairbrush, a hand sanitiser, fragrance, eyedrops and lip balm. I always also carry my make-up bag in my handbag and include multitasking products to save space.

Generally, I only pack the following essentials:

- Foundation (with an added SPF) or BB cream.
- Concealer.
- A cream blush that can double as a lipstick.
- Mascara.
- Eyeliner I prefer a soft kohl that's easy to blend with my fingers.
 If I want to create smoky eyes, this is all I need.

 Red lipstick – the one thing I can just slap on for an instant, pulled-together, elegant look.





My vanity bag goes into my suitcase and contains the following:

- Facial cleansing wipes to remove make-up.
- Facial wash.
- An overnight mask (to boost moisture and encourage skin radiance) that doubles as a night cream.
- A day cream with an added SPF.
- A roll-on deodorant.
- Body lotion.
- Sun protection for face and body.
 A travel toothbrush and a small tube of toothpaste.

top tip for preventing spillage is to gently squeeze all the air out of tubes of products and then close the cap. As an extra safeguard, put liquid products in a zip-loc bag.

I buy shampoo and conditioner at my destination, as these two products tend to be bulky. However, if I'm on a short two- or three-day business trip, I pack sample sachets

of shampoo and conditioner (keep an eye out for these valueadd gifts in magazines).

When packing for a safari, I'm not one for a complete khaki outfit, because it gives the impression that you're trying too hard to look the

part. But I do avoid bright colours and bold prints – not because they frighten animals, but because they frighten fellow safari-goers!

If you embark on a safari in winter, bring really warm stuff. Summer nights can also be cold, so a fleece jacket and a windbreaker are essential.

Pack light. The majority of lodges have laundry services and you'll need to keep weight down if you're travelling in small planes.

My essentials are the following:

A kikoi. This East African sarong is probably the most useful thing you can carry. Wrap it around your head to ward off the sun, protect your mouth from dust, warm your neck on chilly mornings, cushion your camera in between shots and much more.

A sturdy waterproof bag. It protects your camera, lenses and any other items you want to keep dust-free.

A headlamp or flashlight. This is a must for making your way back to your tent on dark nights, when wild encounters are best avoided.

A good pair of compact binoculars.

A bird book of the region to which you're travelling. Even if you're not a twitcher, this is a wonderful companion in the wild. When big game's scarce, birdspotting will keep you enthralled.



A camera is essential for my job and I like the Canon EOS 100D, as it's small and easily portable.

I always pack a **Consol glass water bottle**, which I refill wherever I can, rather than buying plastic water bottles that are thrown into landfills. I never leave home without a **sarong** – it has multiple uses, from a scarf, to a shade cloth or towel.

I also always take a **battery pack** – begone, dead cellphones! – and **sunglasses**, which are useful for watching people without looking creepy!
